<u>Readings</u>: 2 Samuel 1: 1 17-27; 2 Corinthians 8: 7-15; **Mark 5: 21-43**

Reflection

The Gospel reading for this Sunday, Mark 5:21-43, relays two memorable stories of Jesus' actions as a healer. In one a "woman in the crowd" is healed of a long-term affliction when she touches Jesus' cloak. In the other a young girl who is at the point of death is restored to life when Jesus takes her hand and calls her to get up. There are many details in these stories that give us an understanding of Jesus as a healer – his is the kind of healing that not only addresses physical affliction but also enables people to come into full and complete relationship with God. In both these stories there is a "reaching out" to Jesus to request healing. The young girl's father Jairus comes to find Jesus and asks him to attend to his daughter. The woman, whose affliction would have made her an outcast in that community, approaches Jesus from behind and reaches out and touches his cloak. Of the many learnings that are available to us in these stories this is one of the clearest: when we or others we know are unwell or injured or troubled or afflicted we can "reach out". We can reach out to loved ones and friends and we can reach out to God in prayer. And we can know that as a result of our prayers the healing we receive may go way beyond a "cure" and take us into that restoration of a full and complete relationship with God that emerges so often through the healing action and love of Jesus.
